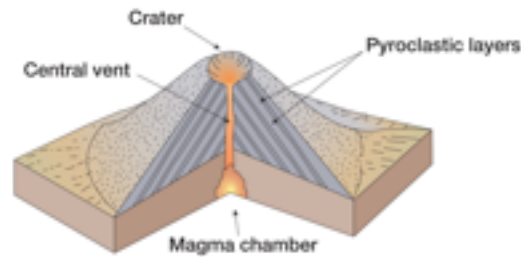


Frayer's Model

Ash-and-Cinder Cone Volcano

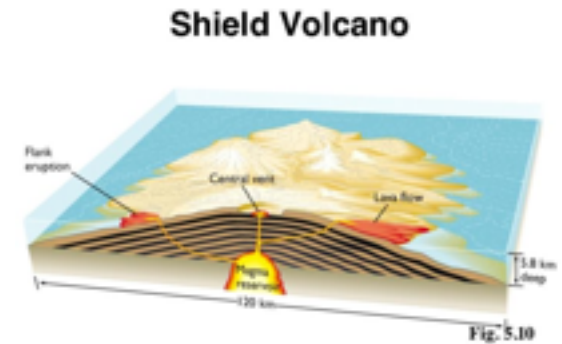
- the smallest type of volcano.
- it has gently sloping sides and a large, bowl-shaped crater.



(a) Cinder cone
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Shield Volcano

- the largest type of volcano.
- it is shaped like a shield that is lying face up on the ground.
- it has a small slope.

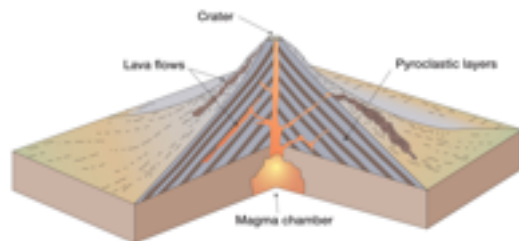


Volcanoes

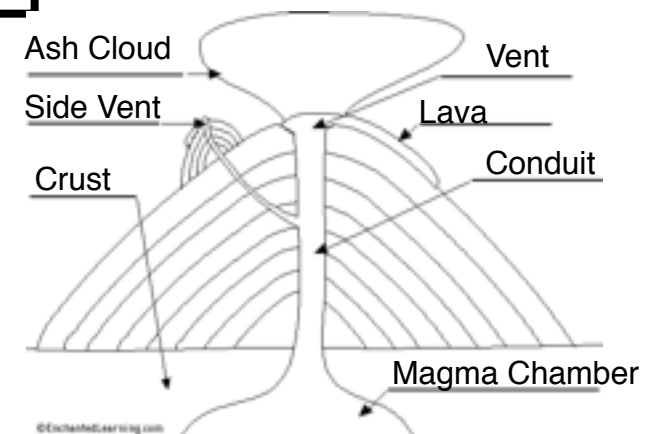
Composite Volcano

- it is formed in a subduction zone.
- it is a tall cone-shaped mountain.
- it has a steep slope.

Also known as a **Stratovolcano**
